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
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

women of lone tree



As a child of an advertising executive father and stay-at-home mom, Wynne's family lived many places in the Midwest and East Coast in the early years of her life. When she came to Colorado to attend college, she knew she had found the place she wanted to stay. Carriage Club in Lone Tree has been her home for more than 20 years, and she has been a proud Colorado resident for over 40 years. She smiles and calls her resident status "nearly native."

Wynne began her career working in a small filing systems and micrographics business, helping her understand the hard work and relationship building required to grow a small business and later, to manage volunteers. Most of her professional career was spent in financial services. She spent the last 23 years at Charles Schwab & Co., Inc., and TIAA before retiring. She led teams and departments focused on active trading, wealth management, retirement planning, client retention, client development, financial market and pricing analysis in a fast-paced, high-growth environment. From this background, Wynne developed her focus on fiscal responsibility and planning for the future.

Her goal for early retirement was to stay as busy with volunteer work as she had been in her career, but with the flexibility to





plan her own schedule. So, she wondered, what type of volunteer work was the best fit? Wynne has a love of historic places and respect for those men and women who have served our country, from those in the military to our first responders. Her fifth great grandfather served as a surgeon's mate in the Revolutionary War, and with proof of that lineage, she became eligible and joined the Daughters of the American Revolution - the DAR. DAR promotes patriotism, historic preservation and education through work in communities across the nation. She served on the boards of two chapters of DAR and successfully led one of these active chapters of 100 women in their work to deliver on their mission. Today, she serves as vice-chair of the State DAR's Leadership Training Committee. Wynne enjoys genealogical research and has helped many friends and neighbors understand their heritage, whether it be from hundreds of years ago, or from more recent times. DAR members attend naturalization ceremonies each month and Wynne says, "I feel a renewed commitment to our country each time I see the smiles and tears of so many brand-new U.S. citizens."

Serving on or chairing an executive board takes some skill in parliamentary procedure. Wynne joined a parliamentarian study group and currently serves as a board member and member of the National Association of Parliamentarians. She is a past Colorado Association of Parliamentarians board member. Several years ago, Wynne joined a women's political club and eventually became a board officer and their webmaster. Additionally, she maintains an educational website, www.weepingwidows.com, to

support widows and widowers, inspired by the loss of her husband in an auto accident in 2002.

Along the way, the opportunity arose to run for public office, which was a role Wynne had never really considered. With the support and encouragement of friends, Wynne has served as a member of Lone Tree's City Council since 2016. She is excited and honored by the prospect of representing the residents of Lone Tree for an additional four-year term. Wynne finds the position intriguing and challenging, from understanding the work of Lone Tree's planning commission and many other citizen boards and commissions, to working alongside what she calls the "world-class City staff." In Wynne's words, "I learn more each day and feel grateful for the opportunity to serve."

In addition to the volunteers on Lone Tree's citizen boards and commissions, Wynne observes how thankful she is for all the volunteers who dedicate hours of their time at the Lone Tree Arts Center and for the Lone Tree Police Department. Wynne notes that thousands of volunteer hours are served at each facility annually and says, "We are grateful to have the time and talent of the many volunteers who make our community so special."

Besides those Council meetings, study and strategy sessions and attendance at city events, each council member is asked to represent the City of Lone Tree on boards and commissions across the metro area. Wynne is a board member for DRCOG, the Denver Regional Council of Governments, and serves as vice-chair of DRCOG's Finance and Budget Committee; board member of the

Forum; and the Chair and past Treasurer for the Douglas County Housing
Partnership. She is an alternate on

across the metro area.

Another opportunity for Lone Tree residents and friends who live nearby to thrive, she notes, is the Living and Aging Well in Lone Tree group. She attends the monthly luncheon meetings regularly, appreciates the interesting speakers, participates in the potlucks and enjoys the camaraderie. "We had a chance to tie the opening of our three new RTD light rail stations in Lone Tree and free rides on opening day, to an empowering field trip for this group," she says. "With the help of several members of the group who had used the light rail before, we journeyed to Union Station and some even took the A-Line to the airport. It was fun, and as I see light rail as a valuable resource for residents and workers in our City, it was nice to introduce my friends in this group to light and commuter rail. I also appreciate the volunteers who helped make our expedition a success."

Wynne is a lover of music, the visual arts and performing arts, so of course, you can often find her at the Lone Tree Arts Center, appreciating the artwork on the walls and talented artists on the main stage. Wynne says, "We have an amazing group of Lone Tree residents who serve on our Arts Commission. They help select the artwork inside and outside of the Arts Center and at strategic points across the City." She is a member of the Lone Tree Arts Center Guild and chairs the Guild's Education



Wynne's daughter, Erin, is a Colorado native and a Certified Nurse Midwife at a Denver hospital. Erin and her husband Mike own and operate a small business: Denver's Premier Sport and Social Club, called, "Meet.Play.Chill." Wynne became a proud grandmother to their son in early 2019 and enjoys every minute of family time.

How does Wynne characterize herself? "I see myself as an eager learner, busy volunteer, lover of history, advocate for others and supporter of my community. Both my work and personal experiences have taught me that while we plan for the future, we must learn from the past, roll with the punches and never forget to take time to enjoy the present."

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



I totally agree.





Have you or someone you know been bitten by a dog? Please read on.

Colorado has ranked #2 in the United States for pet lovers and animal welfare. Only Oregon takes the top spot due to better animal welfare laws. We have some of the best animal protection laws. We have 74 no-kill shelters and 2,150 veterinarians. So why does Colorado still have breed restrictions in five cities? (Aurora, Commerce City, Denver, Louisville and Lone Tree.)

As a society, we have labeled certain breeds as aggressive for so long we have lost sight of the facts about all breeds. Pit Bulls tops that list and it has been proven to be inaccurate. Let's finally put aside the stereotype and get down to facts!

First of all, "dogs are not born bad." Proper training and socialization is needed for any dog as soon as possible. You wouldn't let your children run wild. You are there to teach them right from wrong. Pets (especially dogs) are no different.

To understand dogs, we must go back to the beginning. Dogs evolved from wolves. How? Picture a long time ago wolves scavenging from hunters and getting closer to people and their camps. Gradually wolves became tamer and produced offspring which became even more tame. Eventually, the tame wolves evolved into dogs and became man's best friend.

The human-dog relationship is based on unconditional trust; however, if this trust is lost it is very difficult to reinstate. When a dog is born, they have a "pack mentality"

As for the pack leader (human) it is up to us to set the rules and limitations for our dogs.

They look to the human alfa leader for consistent guidance and behavior that you deem appropriate. A stable relationship is created when your dog understands what you expect from them. Never yell, hit, kick or spank your dog. They do not understand this and will only create an aggressive or fearful dog. You must earn the respect and trust.

So, when we look at the facts of dog bites, in 2019 Pit Bulls were ranked fifth on the list of dog bites in Colorado. 518 bites were reported in the state. Topping the list is Labrador Retriever followed by German Shepherds and American Bulldog. The majority of these bites were in the home. Therefore, it is crucial that as a pet parent we teach and raise them with love, structure and trust.

If we as a society can leave the judgment of a specific breed behavior in the past and focus on the animal itself, we may see a pet that has the same unconditional love and trust to give back. We may be able to appreciate them for what they are, not what we made them out to be. We may see all the different little personalities they have and remember why we love having them around.

As for the city of Lone Tree, I encourage you to bring this ban to an end. As a community of dog lovers together we can be the example for the other four cities to follow. To show love, not hate. Just like people, let's show them that discrimination of any kind should not be and will not be allowed. Kiss your fur babies tonight and let them know they are family and always will be.
